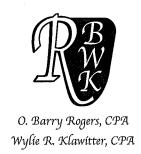

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors of NorthPoint Health & Wellness Center, Inc.

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of NorthPoint Health & Wellness Center, Inc. (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2016, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization

NorthPoint Health & Wellness Center, Inc. (NPI) (the Organization) was incorporated in 2003 with the establishment of a Community Board comprised of 51% consumers and other community stakeholders. The Board entered into a co-applicant agreement with Hennepin County to oversee the operations and health outcomes of the clinic, NorthPoint Health & Wellness Center. Subsequently, the board merged with Pilot City Neighborhood Services Center in July 2004, and the net assets and operations were transferred to the Community Board of Directors. NorthPoint Health & Wellness Center, Inc. is focused on communal wholeness, health and wellness, strengths, possibilities and hope for the North Minneapolis community. The Organization plans to accomplish this through an integrated health and human services model. The Community Board has the responsibility of providing leadership for strategic, operational and programmatic direction of both the clinic (Hennepin County) and human services (NPI). This unique partnership between Hennepin County and the Community Board allows for coownership of resources and assets within the community.

Description of Programs

NPI advocates provide crisis intervention and assist clients with their immediate needs. Program Navigators provide crisis intervention by the use of a Healthy Lifestyle Assessment tool or HLA identifying the customer's immediate needs, determining the root causes of crises and developing a plan of prevention. Interventions include using community resources, information and liaison assistance such as referral to the food shelf, advocating on behalf of the customer for economic or utility assistance, providing support in court hearings and language interpretation, and connecting customers with area agencies or collaborative partners.

Health policy and advocacy department works to reduce the health disparities in communities of color through program development; policy and systems change; utilizing community organizing, education, policy, and advocacy strategies. The focus areas are reducing tobacco use among youth and priority populations, advocate for policies that create access to healthy foods and physical activity and other areas related to the social determinants of health.

Breathe Free North program engages youth and communities of color surrounding the harms of tobacco and educates about long-standing tobacco industry tactics of targeting communities of color. Breathe Free North led the charge in Minneapolis in 2015 for a successful initiative to restrict the sale of flavored tobacco to adult-only tobacco stores and to establish a minimum price for cigars. Additional goals include growing and supporting bicycle ridership, especially in underserved communities, Promote biking as a joyful, normal mode of transportation; grow bike share programs and reaching out and transforming the bike culture in North Minneapolis.

NOTE 1. <u>SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES</u> (CONTINUED)

Description of Programs (continued)

NPI Food shelf embodies a long-standing history of concern and generosity that the people of Minnesota have when it comes to helping those who are hungry and in need in North Minneapolis and the surrounding area. The Food Shelf has steadily grown over the years to provide food assistance to the families in the North Minneapolis and surrounding areas. In 2013, a mobile food unit was introduced to bring produce and nutritional groceries to the senior citizen and vulnerable populations in the community. The Mobile Food Truck now has six locations to which it delivers food and health screening services monthly. The food shelf program provides emergency and supplemental food services to assist with immediate needs and provide resources and referrals to assist with the immediate crisis. NPI partners with Hunger Solutions, Minnesota FoodShare and Mattermore to promote the work of food shelves and purchases food at wholesale prices from Second Harvest Heartland and The Food Group (formerly known as the Emergency Food Network (EFN)). To further our mission of improving the health of our clients we only purchase and stock wholesome, nutritious foods in the food shelf. NPI also goes beyond providing food and basic needs—we work with clients to achieve selfsufficiency. At the food shelf, this means that clients learn about preparing nutritious foods, budgeting their food dollar and shopping for value.

Financial and Housing Counseling has a dual function, serving as both an educational and financial resource to customers. This includes serving as a resource for homeowners to prevent economic losses resulting from foreclosure, providing emergency financial assistance for delinquent rent, and financial assistance for damage or security deposits. One-on-one specialized counseling service areas include: pre-purchase, homeownership, rental delinquencies, home improvement and maintenance, delinquent and defaulted mortgages and contracts, financial counseling, budget assistance, debt extension, consumer education and information.

The Community Health Worker (CHW) program utilizes a multidimensional approach, serving as a bridge between the community residents and health and human service networks. They utilize basic concepts of health, human services and disease management to provide health promotion and disease prevention services in the community. CHW's are formally trained in the fundamental concepts of essential skills necessary for community outreach workers to serve as an effective and reliable community-based health care resource. The anticipated results of the CHW program are: lower health care costs due to increased use of preventive care rather than emergency room visits, lower incidents of disease because of healthier living habits, and increased access to services provided by NorthPoint Health & Wellness Center.

NOTE 1. <u>SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES</u> (CONTINUED)

Description of Programs (continued)

MNsure NorthPoint uses full time bilingual (Spanish, Hmong, Somali) Community Health Workers/Navigators along with a coordinator to provide culturally appropriate outreach, in-reach, education and enrollment assistance to the various ethnic populations in Minneapolis. NorthPoint also has several additional certified Assistors that are able to answer health insurance related questions from individuals that are seeking clarification prior to enrolling.

COACH Under the case management of a bilingual Community Health Worker (CHW), in collaboration with the NorthPoint dental team, children age 0-5 and low-income pregnant women are encouraged to improve their oral health status through participation in a health education, dental screening and follow-up care if needed. The CHW partners with the dental hygienist as they attend community events together to provide information on oral/dental health and offer on-site screening as appropriate.

Gateway is a collaborative project between Hennepin County Human Services Public Health Department and NPI to redesign and integrate the delivery of employment, health, and human services to MFIP families in North Minneapolis. The project works with and across several programs to assist MFIP families that are involved in several systems that present multiple challenges to family stability and economic independence. Maximizing economic and family outcomes while leveraging organizational and community resources are the primary goals of this project.

AAMP (African American Men's Project) has been a long standing program through the clinic originally and now through NPI. AAMP helps African American men become healthy and successful wage earners, fathers and community leaders. AAMP provides encouragement, coaching, support, and assists men with medical needs.

Co Parent Court is a partnership with Hennepin County that works with unmarried parents who are establishing paternity (legal fatherhood) or parenting time for their child. It provides Co-Parent educational classes, gives individual support for moms and dads, and provides a customized parenting plan created just for each family. Many of these services are provided though NPI.

NOTE 1. <u>SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES</u> (CONTINUED)

Description of Programs (continued)

On Point is an Employment Services Provider in partnership with Hennepin County Human Services. On Point employs a Culturally Responsive Services model to assist MFIP participants, especially African American participants, toward a path of personal and professional growth. Following a holistic approach centered on individual development and well-being, On Point provides empowerment coaches and program services that are tailored to address the challenges and opportunities unique to each participant.

Renaissance Outpatient Chemical Dependency Treatment Program is a licensed outpatient chemical dependency treatment program that provides primary, relapse prevention and co-occurring disorders treatment services to meet the diverse needs of adults with substance use disorders. Managed by NPI the Renaissance Program is dually licensed to serve adults with both a mental illness and substance use disorder. The Renaissance Program is licensed as a Rule 31 Chemical Dependency Treatment Program through the State of Minnesota, Division of Licensing.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all unrestricted cash and other highly liquid investments purchased with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. Management provides for uncollectible amounts through a provision for bad debts based on its assessment of the current status of individual account balances that are still outstanding. The allowance for doubtful accounts represents management's best estimate of uncollectible accounts receivable.

Investments

The Organization carries investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and investments in debt and equity securities at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets in the accompanying statement of activities.

Inventory

Inventory consists of donated and purchased food and non-food items, including canned goods, frozen foods, and packaged items. Cost is determined by using an estimated value per pound of inventory on hand, which approximates market value.

NOTE 1. <u>SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES</u> (CONTINUED)

Fixed Assets

Furniture and equipment are recorded at cost, or in the case of contributed property, at the fair market value at the date of contribution. Items that cost \$5,000 or greater are capitalized. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Furniture and Equipment	3-5 years

When assets are retired, or otherwise disposed of, the cost and related accumulated depreciation is removed from the accounts and any resulting gain or loss is reflected in income for the period. The cost of maintenance and repairs is charged to expense as incurred. Renewals and betterments that materially extend the life of an asset are capitalized.

Financial Statement Presentation

The financial statements of NorthPoint Health & Wellness Center, Inc. have been prepared on an accrual basis in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Net assets and revenues, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of NorthPoint Health & Wellness Center, Inc. and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Unrestricted – Resources over which the Board of Directors has discretionary control. Designated amounts represent those revenues that the Board has set aside for a particular purpose.

Temporarily Restricted – Resources subject to a donor-imposed restriction that will be satisfied by actions of the Organization and/or the passage of time.

Permanently Restricted – Resources subject to a donor-imposed restriction that they be maintained permanently. The Organization has no permanently restricted resources at December 31, 2016 or 2015.

NOTE 1. <u>SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES</u> (CONTINUED)

Contributions

Contributions, including unconditional promises to give, are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support, depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the Statement of Activities as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions with restrictions that are met in the year they are received are reported as unrestricted contributions.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Income Taxes

The Organization is exempt from federal and state income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and Minnesota Statute 290.05, except for taxes that might accrue if the Organization were to earn any unrelated business income. The Organization is a non-private foundation, and contributions to the Organization qualify as a charitable tax deduction by the contributor.

Related Party

The Organization's CEO is also the CEO of NorthPoint Health and Wellness Center (the Clinic). The Clinic is overseen by Hennepin County and provides primarily community and medical services. The Organization had receivables totaling \$21,299 and \$2,453 from the Clinic at December 31, 2016 and 2015, respectively.

Concentration of Credit Risk

The Organization maintains its temporary cash investments with high credit quality financial institutions. At times, such investments may be in excess of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) insurance limit. The Organization has not experienced any losses in such accounts. The Organization held funds at a local bank in excess of FDIC insurance limits. The Organization has not incurred any losses in recent years.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing the various programs and services have been summarized on a functional basis. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

NOTE 1. <u>SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES</u> (CONTINUED)

Donated Services, Materials and Equipment

Contributions of non-cash assets are recorded at their fair values in the period received. Contributions of services that create or enhance non-financial assets or that require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation are recorded at their fair values in the period received. See Note 3. During 2016, 559 volunteers donated approximately 11,517 hours to NorthPoint Health & Wellness Center, Inc. In addition, NPI sponsored 8 unpaid internships for approximately 3,061 hours during 2016. The value of these donated services is not reflected in the financial statement since these services do not meet the criteria for recognition under GAAP.

Basis of Accounting

The Organization uses the accrual basis of accounting, whereby revenue and support are recognized when earned or contributed and expenses are recognized when incurred.

Reclassification

Certain accounts in the prior-year financial statements have been reclassified for comparative purposes to conform with the presentation in the current-year financial statements.

Comparative Information

The audited financial statements include certain prior year summarized expense information in total but not by function. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Organization's financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2015, from which the summarized information was derived.

NOTE 4. RETIREMENT PLAN

The Organization has a 401(k) plan for its employees. When eligibility requirements are satisfied, employees can elect to contribute a percentage of their biweekly wage starting at 1% and will receive a dollar for dollar employer match up to 5% of their biweekly wages. As such, a maximum contribution of 5% can be made by the Organization. The contributions totaled \$59,676 and \$42,175 for the years ended December 31, 2016 and 2015, respectively.

NOTE 5. OPERATING LEASES

During 2013, the Organization entered into a 48-month lease for two copiers. Lease expense for office equipment was \$6,155 in 2016 and \$6,155 in 2015.

The minimum lease payments required under the above operating leases as of December 31, 2016, for 2017 is \$4,617.

NOTE 8. INCOME TAX UNCERTAINTIES

NOTE 10. FAIR VALUE

NorthPoint Health & Wellness Center, Inc. adopted Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification Topic 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures ("ASC 820"). In accordance with ASC 820, "fair value" is defined as the price that an organization would receive upon selling an investment in an orderly transaction to an independent buyer in the principal or most advantageous market for the investment. Various inputs are used in determining the value of investments. ASC 820 established a three-tier hierarchy of inputs to establish a classification of fair value measurements for disclosure purposes. The three-tier hierarchy of inputs is summarized in these three broad levels:

- Level 1 Quoted prices in active markets for identical investments.
- Level 2 Other significant observable inputs (including quoted prices for similar investments, interest rates, prepayment speeds, credit risk, etc.)
- Level 3 Significant unobservable inputs.

The Mutual Funds held by NorthPoint Health & Wellness Center, Inc. at December 31, 2016 and 2015 are Level 1 assets valued using a market approach. There were no changes in the valuations techniques during the current year.

NOTE 11. LINE OF CREDIT

In July 2015, the Organization renewed a \$150,000 revolving line of credit. The line has a two-year term, provisions for annual extensions, and includes a due on demand feature. Interest at a rate of 1% over the Index as provided by Bremer Bank, National Association (which was 4.75% and 4.50% at December 31, 2016 and 2015, respectively) is payable monthly. The note is secured by all current assets. No borrowings occurred during 2016 and 2015, and none have occurred in 2017, through the date of the independent auditor's report.

NOTE 12. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Organization has evaluated subsequent events through the date the financial statements were issued, June 12, 2017. There are no subsequent events required to be disclosed in accordance with accounting standards.
